JEAN BERGER (1909-2002) was a German-born pianist, composer, and music educator, receiving his education at the universities of Heidelberg and Vienna. He also studied composition with Louis Aubert in Paris, where he lived from 1933 to 1939. Following two years spent as an assistant conductor at the Municipal Theater in Rio de Janeiro and as a faculty member of the Brazilian Conservatory, Berger moved to the United States and soon worked in the Office of War Information producing foreign-language broadcasts and USO shows. From 1946 to 1948, he worked as an arranger for CBS and NBC. He entered the academic world in 1948 when he joined the faculty at Middlebury College in Vermont. Subsequent appointments would include positions at the University of Illinois and the University of Colorado. This morning's motet is one of his best-known choral works and is rich in gentle, colorful harmonies.



ORGANIST BOYD JONES will be heard in recital at Westminster Church **this Friday evening, March 31, at 8:00**, as part of this season's *Musica Organi* series. Dr. Jones is University Organist and Professor of Music at Stetson University and is an active concert organist and harpsichordist. His program will be wonderfully eclectic, including music by J. S. Bach, Paul Hindemith, Felix Mendelssohn, Johann Pachelbel, Camille Saint-Saëns, Domenico Scarlatti, and William Grant Still, among others. The congregation is cordially invited to attend and a nursery will be provided. Please come out and join us for an enjoyable evening of fine organ music!
