ERIC ADAMCIK, son of Bob and Barbara plus brother of Emma, will be speaking after church in the McKinnon Room about his experience at the International Institute for Islamic Thought (IIIT). The IIIT is an international think tank near Dulles Airport that has held seminars for thirty years on the theology of Islam and its application to government. Eric presented a paper there comparing two Muslim theologians. He is a student at Union Theological Seminary in New York studying Christian theology.

NEW SAFETY TEAM: (from Georgann Byerley) Westminster has had a Safety Task Force at work for several months. At the June 25, 2017 session meeting the elders agreed that the children should be our first priority and approved forming a new group, the Safety Team, to roam during the 11 AM Sunday worship service to supervise the parking lot, hallways, and children's areas. A check-in/check-out system is being formulated for the nursery and children's area downstairs. Three two-way radios have been purchased so that the Senior Usher, the on-duty Safety Team member, and Nursery Attendants downstairs can be in contact if the need arises. We have recruited 17 people so far and are looking for a few more so that each team member will serve in this capacity only twice a year. Scott Porter has agreed to hold a training session for all members of the Safety Team. If you have any questions, please call me at 865-679-9618. If this is something that you feel you can help with, please let me know as soon as possible. We would like to have the Safety Team in place and trained by September 10th when we start up our fall schedule. Thank you so much for your consideration of this important team!

FAMILY PROMISE OF KNOXVILLE is a non profit organization whose mission is "to help homeless and low income families achieve sustainable independence". The Pasta and Bluegrass Festival is their biggest fundraiser of the year. It is a great night of fun for the whole family. There will be live music from two bluegrass bands "The Y'uns" and the "Trinity Boys". The evening includes an Italian Market with artisan wares for sale as well as homemade cakes and cookies. There will also be a Children's Festival. The night begins at 5:00 on Aug. 26th at Central Baptist Church of Bearden with fifteen tastings of competition level pasta . The doors close at 7:00 .
